Reading:

Reading together is the single most effective way to help children become proficient readers. Reading develops vocabulary, comprehension, and general knowledge needed to understand books when they get older.

Writing:

Reading and writing go together! Scribbling and drawing are forms of writing and help develop hand eye coordination and fine motor skills.

Singing:

Singing slows language down so children can hear the different sounds in words and is a fun bonding experience, whether you're a good singer or not! Singing also develops listening and memory skills.

Playing:

Play is a primary way young children learn about how the world works and helps them practice putting their thoughts into words.

Talking:

Children learn about language by listening to parents and caregivers. Talk to them about your daily activities, different events, and ideas to expand their vocabulary. Very young children can understand spoken words long before they can speak.
